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
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pen Day Report - 26th October

With the annual exhibition behind us, our club's Open Day was a relatively casual affair. In the days leading up to this bi-annual event and with little formality, floors were cleaned, chairs and tables rearranged, and notices updated on the computer. Wednesday was a tense time for the 0 Gauge team with some concerns about the operations of the club's newest layout – the modular 0 Gauge *Past and Present*. With patience and persistence, and a few expletives, the problems were fixed.

Early Saturday saw a flurry of activity as the tarpaulin and gazebo were erected, entry stand set up, notices posted, kitchen and barbecue readied and layouts set up for running. Fortunately, members are fairly practised at these activities after many years of running an open day, and everything was ready by the time the first visitors arrived a little before 10am.

Visitors were directed to the layouts that interested them most, although many had come to see what there was, without any preference for one scale or another. Those who had layouts at home were encouraged to talk to the club members who were running trains of their chosen scale. One modeller wondered where his Hornby Dublo collection would fit in. We talked about theme night running and how that would accommodate his scale. In any case, as members know, the club operates for all; and Dublo equipment would be fitted in with the American, Australian, Continental European and Japanese models that run on *Stoney Creek*, often all at the same time.

Many of the visitors were old faces, repeat visitors who come regularly to see what changes there have been. I encouraged them to note the developments that had taken place since their last visit. In the case of N Gauge, the improvements over the stair-well were easily recognised. Equally for the 0 Gauge which has enjoyed a deal of attention to scenery and effects. Many visitors had not seen *Past and Present* before, so it provided a new point of interest, not just because of the period of time covered by the models but the technological change in the method of controlling model trains.

The developments on *Stoney Creek* include a newly decorated corner and operating signals on the layout. These were a talking point but a casual observer would not necessarily see the more subtle changes without some prompting. There were many admirers of Stoney Creek Control Centre which is where some of the changes are on show. However to many of the attendees, mainly juniors, the most appealing aspect of the layouts was seeing lots of trains operating, in many cases the faster the better.

The U-Drive was in operation allowing younger visitors to try their hands as drivers. A new club member, Tomas Bulic, stepped up to the task of being chief operator for much of the afternoon, and proved an able assistant to Bill Whale.

I noticed a number of visitors negotiating a purchase at the sole member-run commercial stand, and John Smythe made a number of book sales from surplus library stock.

The efforts of Marilyn and Barry (The Chef) Wilcockson, Pat Sorenson and Annette Hinczak providing the catering is appreciated. Kerry set up and ran the craft stall for the day and her efforts are appreciated also. The N-gauge 'team' – Ash, Richard, Kevin – with other club members and committee set up the marquee, manned the entry and acted as hosts to the visitors as they arrived and departed. Barry Green, Ken Auchterlonie and Peter O'Brien did a sterling job welcoming visitors as they arrived. Others contributed also, and their help is appreciated.

At the end of the day, 232 visitors had been to visit our club, and every report I heard was positive. Due to the efforts of a number of members throughout the day, the total takings, that is entry donations, kitchen, barbecue, U-Drive and book sales generated funds to help keep our club going forward on a sound footing.

Thanks to members who set up and managed the trains on all 5 layouts. In all, a good day.

Gauge Layouts


Both the fixed layout and exhibition layout *Past and Present* ran continuously throughout the Open day without any problems occurring.

A Tortoise Point Motor will need to be replaced. The point motor for the UP direction departure makes a clicking sound; I suspect that the noise is from a miss aligned gear, or just normal operation. Uprive

The most recent public usage of the U-Drive was at our Exhibition and the following Open Day. For the exhibition we had a total of about 600 kids operating, down a bit compared to



previous years, but in keeping with the reduced numbers of people who attended the exhibition. Although we make a point of telling visitors on open days that we are not charging for kids to use the U-Drive, it is interesting that often they happily slip a donation into our donation tins...

It is pleasing to report that the trains and layout in general worked very well, with a minimum of derailments and other troubles. During the last hour of the exhibition the outside track went dead. Due to being so close to closing, it was decided the matter could be better looked at when the U-Drive was set up again in the clubrooms. This was duly done and it was discovered that the top speed limiter for the outer track was open circuiting unless the knob was turned to the full-speed position. It was operated in this condition on the Open Day due to a lack of spares, with verbal warnings to the young customers to "slow it down a bit" if the train was going too fast. This arrangement worked well. At the time of writing, a new potentiometer is yet to be fitted.

I must say thank you again to Jason Every, who has been my faithful helper in staffing the U-Drive for many years. He has been a big help, has virtually grown up with the layout; and is a knowledgeable and reliable instructor for those who get rostered to operate the layout, but who have not done the job before. It is also very helpful that others have taken the trouble to learn how to help or supervise the dismantling and setting up without me being present, and I thank them for that.
